'Cabaret' auditions scheduled

Gilroy Community Theatre's next production, will be held June 4 and 5 at 7:30 p.m. in the Gilroy High School music building.

A cast of at least 35 persons is needed, ranging in age from teenagers to middle-aged adults. Women should wear slacks or shorts and flat shoes for the audition, according to Karl Schuck who will direct the musical. Schuck previously directed the group's production of "The Star-Spangled Girl.'

The stage version of "Cabaret" is totally different from the film, although the theme is basically the same.



On stage 'Cabaret' outsparkles footlights

Gilroy Community Theatre's perfectly marvelous production of "Cabaret" opens tonight at 8 o'clock to a full house in the Gavilan College Theatre.

Produced by GCT president Greg Guerin and directed by San Jose's Karl Schuck, the Tony Award winning musical depicts social decadence in Germany with the emergence of Naziism.

Gilroy's Sandra Rapazzini, a veteran GCT performer, gives an enchanting portrayal of Sally Bowles, a young English girl-gone-wrong who works in a Berlin cabaret, the Kit Kat Klub. She projects the charm and vigor of a nightclub entertainer in "Don't Tell Mama" and "Cabaret," while she commands sympathy for Sally's idealism and longings when singing "Maybe This Time."

David Jackson of Hollister in the leading male role as Clifford Bradshaw provides a gruly credible performance of an aspiring young American writer who finds himself in the Berlin cabaret on New Yer's Eve. Clifford happens upon Sally, she moves into his room, and they begin a love affair with the duet "Perfectly Marvelous."

Fraulein Schneider, the sometimes hypocritical but usually realistic spinster who rents rooms, is played by Gilroy's Mary Ann Bruegmann, another veteran GCT performer. Mrs. Bruegmann handles a difficult singing role with remarkable skill, especially in the number "So What," which has a five key change. Her gestures in the fruit shop dance are superb comedy.

Without a doubt, Aromas' James Maya is perfectly cast as Herr Schultz. The Jewish fruit shop proprietor and Fraulein Schneider sing "It Couldn't Please Me More" (or the pineapple song) and "Married."

One of the finest songs in the show is "Meeskite," sung by the touching and warm Schultz to entertain

guests at a party in honor of his marriage engagement to Fraulein Schneider.

Carol Spendlove of Gilroy as Fraulein Kost and Tony Tomaro of Morgan Hill as Herr Ernst lend fine portrayals of a prostitute and a Nazi movement leader. Fraulein Kost leads into "Tomorrow Belongs to Me," followed by Ernst and finally, the party guests, to the mutual horror of Fraulein Schneider and Bradshaw.

Not to be forgotten in the list of leading characters is Morgan Hill's Frank Vanella as Master of Ceremonies (emcee) of the Kit Kat Klub. Venella's singing abilities and acting skills both serious and comic, are applied well to several songs and dances including "Willkommen" and "Two Ladies." Whenever on stage, the attention is his.

The over 20 supporting performers casted as sailors, waiters, and members of the chorus work well together in their several crowd scenes of "Willkommen," the fruit shop dance, and the finale.

Choreographer Debbie Nelson of San Jose joined GCT's current efforts within the last month and deserves special commendation for her job well done with an adaptable cast.

With the assistance of costume designer Dominee Mauer of San Jose, all of the cast is attractively and appropriately outfitted.

Musical director Sam Talluto of San Jose leads both a stage band and orchestra and insures that his outstanding all-volunteer musicians delight but do not overpower the performers. Faith Peterson assisted the musical as rehearsal pianist.

Ed Perkins of Gilroy handles technical aspects of the

production as technical director.

Repeat performances will be given Aug. 16, 22, 23, 29, and 30 at 8 p.m. in the Gavilan College Theatre. Tickets may be purchased at Crispino's in Gilroy and Dick Bruhn's in Gilroy and Hollister.

To all of those who made the party a success, our congratulations. The turn out was the best we've seen locally in a long time and everyone deserves a big hand for their efforts.






