



"Knuckles Norton," a rival gang leader.



Friday evening, and play the next three weekends, at Gavilan College Theatre. The play is a take off on the hilarious movie, "Some Like It Hot," starring" Marilyn Monroe, Tony Curtis and Jack Lemon.

Despite the problems expected at Wednesday's dress rehearsal, the practice came across as a tight, near professional production. "Sugar" is sure to leave tonight's opening audience laughing all the way home.

The plot is simple and tailor made for laughs. Two unemployed musicians in trouble with the mob, dress as women in order to join an all female band leaving Chicago for Miami.

Joe, played by Frank Vanella, and Brad Ryder as Jerry, masquerade as Josephine and Daphne and get employed by the band.

A millionaire played by Frank Pattie falls in love with Jerry. Pattie is excellent in his role as Sir Osgood Fielding, delivering some of the best lines in the show and dancing and professionally singing

Frank Vanella and Brad Ryder as the two female impersonators are hysterical. The two act like the old friends they are supposed to be and complement each other wonderfully. Both have excellent voices and a talent for comedy delivery.

The movie role played by Marilyn Monroe stars Mary Gorak as Sugar. She plays her. dumb blond role without flaw. She looks like a show girl and her singing sounds like something off an old 78 RPM record.

Linda Talluto as the abrasive leader and matron of the "Society Syncopaters," and Joe Breznak as Beinstock, their manager are also cast' well:

Spats, the mobster lookingfor Joe and Jerry, is portrayed by Ron Williams, who plays Spats as a cliche gangster, the way he should be played.

The Depression era costumes are great; they do a lot to make up for sets that are a little shoddy. Since the actors were responsible for much set construction, in addition to rehearsal, the shortcoming is understandable.

The direction of Russ Hendrickson has tied "Sugar" together. He has supervised a number of the GCT's productions successfully and has done it again. The Hendrickson touch



'Sugar' difficult to pull off

GILROY—The Gilroy Community Theatre played to a near-capacity house Friday night, July 15 at Gavilan College with its most recent production, "Sugar," a musical comedy directed by Russell Hendrickson.

Hendrickson managed to pull off this antiquated vehicle—an anachronistic (sexist) poke at sex and sex roles, and themes that flirt with homosexuality.

Certainly it was not the play itself, but the cast's enthusiasm which allowed the ideas and predictable jokes to be served up one more time. with some degree of palatability. They do pull it off as the audience's warm response throughout the show indicated.

Early scenes were paced for a snail race, but as the evening proceeded, the action speeded up and the cast relaxed into their roles. By the second run, July 22-23, timing should be in good or great shape and continue July 29-30.

Musical director Sam Talluto did an excellent job. Seldom were even the weakest voices drowned out.

Mary Jane Gorak, who played the Sugar lead, a role immortalized by Marilyn Monroe in

the movie version, "Some Like It Hot," managed well to capture the vitality of her character. Her voice carried the songs and she appeared well in control throughout.

Frank Vanella and Brad Ryder played duo female musicians in disguise. Vanella sang well. Unfortunately, the show has only one memorable song.

Ryder improved as the show moved along and delivered several priceless lines.

Ron Williams was electric as a caricature of a thirties hoodlum, playing each second on stage to the limit and adding real sparkle.

Though the choreography is nothing to write home about, the chorus held up well—bright faces, colorful costumes and all.

Frank Pattie (Sir Osgood Fielding) and Linda Morris Talluto (Sweet Sue) did good jobs, but were a little stiff on opening night.

Overall, the show provides good family entertainment. Congratulations to the cast and crew for turning this turkey into a peacock. One still can't help but wonder why the effort, when there are so many fine and still funny musicals to choose from.

Standing ovation accorded cast of 'Sugar'

The standing ovation accorded the cast of the Gilroy Community Theater's production of "Sugar" at the end of the musical Saturday night indicated that much, if not most, of lthe near-capacity audience had enjoyed the show immensely.

This viewer, however, left feeling that the value of a standing ovation had somehow been cheapened.

The play, which finishes its three-week run at the Gavilan College Theater Friday and Saturday at 8 p.m., did have its high moments.

The overall performance, however, suffered from a surplus of lackluster singing and acting and a lack of energy and creative choreography.

"Sugar" is a love story which revolves around two unemployed male musicians who masquerade as women and join an all-girl band so that they can escape mobsters who want them to listen to tunes on their "violins."

The script, based on the screenplay "Some Like It Hot" by Billy Wilder and I.A.L. Diamond, makes the most of the comical possibilities of men in an all-girl band.

Many of the humorous lines were lost rhough because of poor delivery. Others were lost on a slow audience. Some were lost to a combination of both.

Of the entire cast, Gilroy High graduate Brad Ryder, who portrayed Jerry, the bass player, seemed to find the audience's funny bone the most often. Jerry becomes Daphne upon joining the band. He is amorously pursued by millionaire senior citizen. Sir Osgood Fielding, played by Frank Pattie.

Jerry's disguised partner Joe, played by Frank Vanella, becomes attracted to Sugar Kane, the blond bombshell in the band and dons glasses and matching cap and convinces her that he is a millionaire. Vanella gives the strongest all-around performance in Sugar" as he proves himself to be an actor and the only lead player with a truly singing voice. Fortunately, many of the show's songs were group numbers where individual weaknesses were effectively masked.

Sugar, the object of Joe's romantic scheming, is played by acting veteran Mary Jane Gorak. Gorak is convincing as the vacuous, tittering blonde in search of a young, bespectacled millionaire.

Ron Williams, as Spats, the mob leader who wants Joe and Jerry rubbed out, delivers the outstanding supporting performance of the production

Throughout trhe two-act play, Spats moves across the stage tap dancing in a slow cadence. Even while standing, his foot never stops tapping.

Decked in white from his spats to his hat, Williams does a hilarious, drawn-out death scene which drew welldeserved ovation.

Linda Talluto, as Sweet Sue, the authoritarian band leader and Joseph Bereznak, as Bienstock, the tin-eared band manager, give credible supporting performances.

Many of the smaller roles suffered from unenergetic, innocuous performances. During one dance number, the stoic expressions the faces of the dancers give the scene a bizarre comical effect which went unappreciated by most of the audience.

The choreography was equally uninspired. With the few dance numbers the production included it is unfortunate they were not done with more imagination.

The sets on the other hand benefitted from simplicity. And nicely-arranged use of the stage in front of the curtain allowed the production to go off smoothly with no breaks between scenes.

The pit orchestra, under the direction of Sam Talluto, also kept the play moving at a good tempo.
