SVCT's show goes on despite no home base

MORGAN HILL — For a theater company still without a home, what better place to present an intimate play that requires an intimate setting, than in a place with a homey atmosphere.

Such is the case facing the latest production by the South Valley Civic Theater.

In a unique twist, SVCT will present Neil Simon's "California Suite," inside the new home of Rosso's Furniture Store at Tennant Station in Morgan Hill for five weekends beginning Oct. 24.

Producer Steve Bauman said that when plans to do the show began, SVCT was again faced with the dilemma of where to put on the show since they had been forced out of their Tennant Station playhouse in 1995.

"We thought of doing a dinner show in a restaurant, but then decided the ticket prices would end up being too expensive," Bauman said.

In many productions, Jaime Rosso, president of Rosso's Furniture, had lent pieces of furniture to SVCT to help in productions.

"Since this play requires some free standing furniture, it occurred to me that instead of dragging the furniture out of the store, that maybe there would be a small space in the store where we could do the show," said Bauman.

Rosso needed to think only for a moment before agreeing to the idea.

"We've always supported the theater and this was an opportunity to help while they're in transition," Rosso said. "I think it can be a win-win situation.'

After walking around Rosso's location, which used to be the old Safeway store at

"It is a unique setting," Bauman said. In order to house the SVCT production,

Rosso will put on hold plans to convert the back area of the store into several display areas where he is planning to put office furniture and expand the children's furniture area.

"We will have to scale back some plans we had for that space," Rosso said. "The requirements it takes to do a show here will require a certain amount of disruption, bût we want to be partners in this, and we'll make it work.

With a new warehouse in Gilroy, Rosso will move his clearance items to the Gilroy store on the corner of Tenth and

Monterey Road.

Logistically, SVCT producers and technical staff will have to work out the details? of lighting and set design to accommodate the show.

"We will have a raised stage, and the audience will be able to sit up close to the stage," Bauman said. "This show doesn't require a lot of special effects lighting, so the lighting changes will be quite subtle."

Although the play doesn't open to the public until Oct. 24, SVCT will begin moving into Rosso's on Oct. 11 to set up the stage. This will give technical lightings and sound crew a chance to see what they need, what will need to be brought' in and what will and won't work in terms of doing the show.

The actors, being directed by Jeremy Lefferts, have been rehearsing in a classroom at San Martin School. They will have their first opportunity to rehearse in the converted theater and get used to the. stage just four days before the show

opens.
