The team of actors has begun practicing watching a Chicago Cubs game, and the roster includes Bob Eltgroth, Nicole Bowers, Chris Souza, Steve Spencer, Dick DeBolt, Luke Rideout, Bill Corneth, April Ouillette, Yolanda Cotterall and Nick Rocchi. planned on Friday, Oct. 15 at


8 p.m.

## SVCT is running into its 30th season

The SVCT season will come to an end with "The Secret Garden," a show for all ages. Because SVCT does not have a permanent theater to call their own, it is important to become part of the mailing list to hear about audition dates and performance locations.

Now showing is the adult drama "Bleacher Bums." This nine-inning comedy takes place in the bleachers of Wrigley Field during a game between the Cubs and the Cardinals. The show is

directed by past SVCT president Marion Pintello, produced by Christine McElroy and Jeff Patereau with design by Whitney McClelland. This combination of talent is sure to provide a much-anticipated show. Guests are invited to come early and enjoy the full baseball experience with hot dogs, beer and soft drinks.
