y kids have hundreds of books: some gifts, some purchased over the years, most from used book sales, a few new. A treasured few are left over from my childhood.

Recently, for lack of anything important to do, I performed the perennial task of resorting all the kids' books back into alphabetical order by author's last name: Alcott, Allen, Anderson, Ardizonne, Banks, Barrie, Baum, Brink, Brown, Burnett ...

We have two by Frances Hodgson Burnett: "A Little Princess," still with its glossy pink paper cover, bought new for Anne's ninth Christmas, and my old copy of "The Secret Garden," with its shabby turquoise cover, scotch-taped spine, impassioned illustrations, and unparalleled prose.

"When Mary Lennox was sent to Misselthwaite Manor to live with her uncle everybody said she was the most disagreeable-looking child ever seen. It was true, too."

This opening captivated me when I was 8 years old, and I read on breathlessly to discover who Mary was, and why she was so

From India in the midst of a cholera epidemic, by steamer, train, and brougham, to the Yorkshire moors and a gloomy manor with mysterious secrets, I followed her, stumbling over the hard words. For the next four years, "The Secret Garden" was one of my very favorite books.

I rejoiced when I turned 10, because I was as old as Mary, and I felt a little sad to turn 11 and leave her behind. Something about the book's message of the redemptive power of Nature and Nature's God sank deep into my soul.

Now South Valley Civic Theater is performing "The Secret Garden." I am going to see it with my 10-year-old daughter, who is as thin as Mary ever was, and sometimes as sour. I hope the play is even half as good as the book. I wonder how they are going to manage the robin, and how they are going to use sets to convey the magic of spring transforming a garden.
